SIKKIM: A MEMOIR

fter completing my Masters in 1990, while Ateaching at a parallel college in Kattappana, it was my hobby to apply for all the job advertisements seen in newspapers, the only available media in those days. Thus, I received a call letter for an interview outside Kerala after having a detailed analysis of pros and cons, I decided to go ahead. It was for the first time that I travelled in a train outside Kerala. My first experience of travelling by a train was when I got an opportunity to see Pope John Paul II. That was a free trip from Changanasherry to Kottavam. I didn't even have the common sense to book a ticket for a train journey but I managed to mount a Calcutta bound train. With the help of God Almighty and co passengers I reached Calcutta and from there to Siliguri by train. One Malayali army officer helped me to reach the bus station and he bought me a bus ticket to Gangtok at twelve noon. and he bid me goodbye at eight in the morning.

Fortunately, I met two other Malayali people who had come for the interview, which I was going to attend. But they took ticket in another bus. While talking with them, I met Mr Jayapraksh Mishra from Orissa, who came to attend the interview for teaching commerce. With him I reached Gangtok at 6 in the evening and got into a single room in a hotel. In the room I saw two mattresses on the cot, and there was no blanket. By arranging the two beds and using a thin bed sheet, I managed to sleep in that freezing cold. In the morning, I had a bath in the water which could measure about 4 degree Celsius. It was only later that I came to know that, out of the two mattresses one was a quilt intended to cover the body and there was an electric heater in the bathroom for hot water.

I got ready and went for the interview. I was astonished to see numerous Malayali people there. There were eight Malayalis for Commerce itself. Mr Poyil Ravindranath, the P.A to Education Director in

the interview board was a half Malayali. Shortly after my interview, he asked me, whether there was anyone in Sikkim to communicate with me after leaving Sikkim. I came back to Kerala and after two months, in the beginning of March, I received the appointment letter. This time I booked the train ticket myself.

My institution was in a mountainous region called Pelling in the district of Geyzing (West Sikkim). Mr Jeffo Joseph from Aluva was there in the institution, for six months, and then he went back to Kerala, as he got another job. Till then we stayed together at the government quarters. But by then I had made contact with the colleagues and Malayali people in that area, which helped me to continue there. Letters, which will be arriving once in a month from home, was the only medium of communication then. After the establishment of cable T.V and dish T.V communication became easier.

Now here are some interesting facts about Sikkim. It is the second smallest State in India. The population was only four lakhs at the time I reached there, of which only 50% of the people were literate. But today, they have attained the fifth position in literacy rate. Many of the students, I taught at Sikkim in 12th Standard were older than me. It was through the help and hospitality given by the Principal, colleagues and students and also by adjusting myself to the culture and tradition of Sikkim, that I was able to complete twenty one years in educational service.

In 2011, an earthquake occurred in Sikkim, which killed almost sixty people. In that October, I was awakened by the loud noise and screaming of people just to witness the crashing of a four storied building. There was no contact with home for three days. And it was one of the serious occasions in my life, where I saw the hand of an omnipresent God.

In 2013, I returned to Kerala taking voluntary retirement because of my desire to stay with my family. But that State, the people there, that village where I spent the major part of my life, which gave me immense pleasure and a splendid experience, is always a spec in my memory that cannot be erased.


She takes pride in her ability to eavesdrop. Miss Brill excludes herself from the rest of the people. Miss Brill quickly distances herself even from the elderly people around her.

SOFTWARE JOBS PAY TWICE THE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Things are looking good these days for software industry workers, who are making more than twice the average annual wage of other workers, according to a research report released this week by software.org.; The BSA. foundation

The average annual wage for software jobs in the US was \$ 11400 in 2019, more than double in \$51960 annual wage for all US workers in 2018. All told, the software industry directly employs 3.1 million people in the US-up by 7.3% from 2016 and indirectly supports a total of 14.1 million jobs. Of the 3.1 million software industry jobs in the US, California led the way with 557,657 of those jobs followed by Texas with 244,830 software industry jobs and Virginia with 188,939

The software industry invested more than \$82 billion in research and development in 2018, accounting for more than 22 percent of US domestic R&D. The software industry has expanded by 19% since 2016. The number of software industry jobs grew twice as fast as overall U.S job growth.

Bitcoin is a digital currency that was started in 2009. It uses peer-to-peer technology to facilitate instant payments. This is designed to allow users to process transactions through digital units of exchange called bitcoins. Transactions are verified by network nodes through cryptography and recorded in public distributed ledges called Black chain. It was invented using the name Satoshi Nakamoto and its source code was released as open source software.

The bitcoins are created as a reward for a process known as mining. They can be exchanged for other currencies, products and services. However it has been criticized for its use in illegal transactions, its high electricity consumption price, volatility and thefts from exchange as a currency. Also there is a possibility that governments might force merchants to not use bitcoins to ensure that users' transactions can be tracked.

As a conclusion it could be stated that, though a modern form of currency, Bitcoin has not gathered much popularity, thus, failing to realize the full potential of the software that otherwise might be beneficial to modern economy. Here, a positive approach towards the emerging virtual currency might open new opportunities in the economic sphere. Therefore the need is to enable the acceptance and functioning such digital forms of currency in the Indian market.

Since there is no way for third parties to identify, track, or intercept transactions that are denominated another advantage of this software is that sales taxes are not added on any purchases like other online payment systems. Bitcoin users can pay for their wins from whoever they have internet access. This means that for purchasing one does not have to travel to a bank or a store to buy a product.

Bit coins are still accepted only by a very small group of online merchants. This makes it unfeasible to completely rely on this software. After early proof-of-concept transactions the first major uses of bitcoin were black market such as silkroad. During its 30 months of existence beginning in 2017 it rose to \$13412.44 on January 2018 after reaching its all-time high of \$1978.06 on 17 December 2017.

Further, the bitcoin payments are processed through a private network of computers linked through shared programme. Each transaction is simultaneously recorded in a block chain on each computer that uptakes and informs all accounts. Bitcoin purchases are discrete. Unless a user voluntarily publishes by bitcoin transactions, his purchases are never associated with his personal identity much like cash-only purchases and cannot be tracked back to him.
























Trolls & Trolling
















Exchequer DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS

resulted in this! No problem at all. I may also go to some abbey like Addison to solve this problem of over enjoyment. I stood










Déplacer DEPARTMENT OF TRAVEL AND TOURISM
